National Merit Recognition

Dillon Chen '25 was recognized as a semi-finalist in the 70th annual National Merit Scholarship Program.

Congress of Future Medical Leaders

Zoe Glentz Brush '25 was a Delegate to the Congress of Future Medical Leaders—an honors-only program for high school students from across the country who want to become physicians or enter the medical research field.

4 Young Playwrights

The one-act plays of four students were selected for recognition at the Vermont Young Playwrights' Festival.

8 United States Presidential Scholars Program

Eight students were selected as candidates for this program that honors some of our nation's most distinguished graduating high school seniors. They were eight out of 600 semifinalists.



FIRST Robotics

The SJA FIRST Robotics Team was awarded the Rising All-Star Award for their growth in membership, sponsorship, outreach, perseverance, and professionalism.

Advanced Placement

Fifteen students earned the AP Capstone Diploma, and nine earned the AP Capstone Seminar and Research Certificate.

1st Scholars' Bowl

The SJA Scholars Bowl Team placed first at the Vermont National Education Association Scholars' Bowl Central Regional Competition.

Art and Writing Awards

Twenty-three students were recognized in the 2025 Vermont Scholastic Art and Writing Award Competition, receiving 43 awards for both Fine Art and Writing—four Gold Keys, ten Silver Keys, and 29 Honorable Mentions.

SJA's Model UN Club hosted a conference with students from across Vermont. Five students were recognized for serving as committee chairpersons, and three were recognized for their effective performance as delegates.



National Student Poet

Marcus Burns '26 was selected as the 2024 National Student Poet for the Northeast by the Institute of Museum and Library Services and the Alliance for Young Artists & Writers. He was one of only five students nationwide to receive this honor.

SkillsUSA

At the Vermont competition, SJA students earned gold medals in Baking and Pastry Arts (Devlin Murphy '27), Restaurant Services (Dominic Gilley '25), and TeamWorks (Justin Louis '25, Ernie Roy '25, Casey Prue '25, and Connor Brigham '25). Bronze medals were earned in Plumbing (Calvin Andre '25) and Welding Sculpture (Molly Larrabee '27).

5th The TeamWorks group took fifth place out of 34 teams at the National SkillsUSA Conference in Atlanta, Georgia.

FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP NOTES

- SJA's tuition growth is lower than the average for the state of Vermont. SJA's 2024-2025 tuition was essentially level with the statewide Average Allowable Tuition for public high schools, and most high schools in our region cost more per pupil than the Academy.
- Capital projects are funded through fundraising initiatives and not taxpayer dollars.
